MORT'S DOCK

My father, the late Charles Robert McArthur Allt, who was born in Balmain in 1863, related to me the derivation of Mort's Dock as it is known today.

The dock was founded by my great-grandfather, the late Thomas McArthur and was originally known as Thomas McArthur & Co. - reference is made to this company in the John's Notable Australians 'Who is Who' in Australasia, 1908 edition under the name of Thomas R. Allt, who married Mr. Thomas McArthur's daughter Jane McArthur.

To enable the establishment of the company, a number of associates invested money in the dock, among those were Captain T.S. Rowntree, Captain James Neill Creer and his twin brother Mr. Patrick Creer, who was an engineer, also Captain W.J. Johnstone, Captain Trouton. In later years Thomas Sutcliffe Mort invested money in the dock, enabling an expansion of the dock. Mr. McArthur then took Mr. Mort into partnership and the dock was then named McArthur & Mort. Tragedy befell Mr. McArthur when he drank water from the roof of the dock which contained lead-oxide, killing him at the age of 49 years.

Even in those early years Mr. McArthur had plans for a bridge to be built over the Harbour. No known date was ever recorded of when the dock was built, but it was thought to be before 1830.

Mr. McArthur died intestate; and upon his death, Mr. Mort divided his share among the employees of the dock. Mr. Thomas R. Allt maintained that Mr. Thomas McArthur was one of the most brilliant engineers ever to come to Australia.

After Mr. McArthur's death, Mr. Thomas S. Mort renamed the dock MORT'S DOCK.

THOMAS ROBERT ALLT

Thomas Robert Allt was born in Greenwich (Eng.) in 1837 and came to Australia as a young man twenty years later. He was a very prominent citizen in Balmain and resided at "Minevia", situated on Ballast Point, and fronted by big iron gates. It later became a boarding house, but now the site of this old homestead is occupied by Caltex Oil Refinery. Mr. Harold Fraser, the well-known actor who was born in Balmain, remembers the home and told me it was a tragedy that the National Trust did not preserve it. Miss Enid Deloitte, whose family were also associated with Balmain, told me she had stayed in the big old home "Minevia".

Mr. Allt, whilst living in Balmain, set up business as a Wine & Spirit Merchant, having his first office in 1856 in premises opposite the old burial ground. With the advance of time that portion of Sydney changed and the old burial ground passed away, upon its site being the now fine Town Hall which is such an ornament to the city. From George Street Mr. Allt moved to York Street and then to Pitt Street. Mr. Allt was the first person to introduce Wolff's Schnapps into Australia.

Mr. Allt owned a considerable amount of property in Balmain and was a very keen bowler and formed the Balmain Bowling Club.

After leaving Balmain Mr. Allt moved to "Brundah" in Enfield, when he entered the shipping business, thus forming the North Coast Shipping Company. Mr. Allt formed the Strathfield Bowling Club and was playing up to the Saturday before his death.

"Brundah" is now Leigh College, a training college for Methodist Ministers.

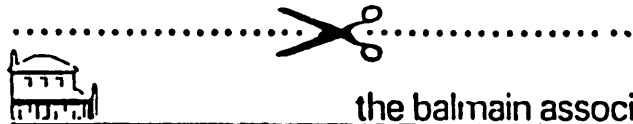
